MARK SIDEL'S teaching, writing and research interests focus on Asian law, comparative law, law and development, human trafficking, and the nonprofit sector and philanthropy in Asia and the U.S. He is the Doyle-Bascom Professor of Law and Public Affairs at the University of Wisconsin and previously, a professor of law at the University of Iowa and an attorney in New York, Beijing and Hong Kong.



Professor Sidel is the author of eight books, including *The Constitution of Vietnam: A Contextual Analysis* (Hart 2009), and has written numerous articles for academic and professional journals. He is the editor of the Routledge book series on Civil Society in Asia. He served as a consultant to the U.S. State Department on human trafficking and labor law issues and as the sole litigative consultant to the U.S. Department of Justice in *U.S. v. Kil Soo Lee et al.* Sidel has extensive experience in international philanthropic and funding communities,

including his role on the Ford Foundation team that established their office in China and as one of the first program officers.

Sidel speaks and reads Chinese and reads Vietnamese. He earned an A.B. in History from Princeton University, an M.A. in History from Yale University and a J.D. from Columbia Law School.
