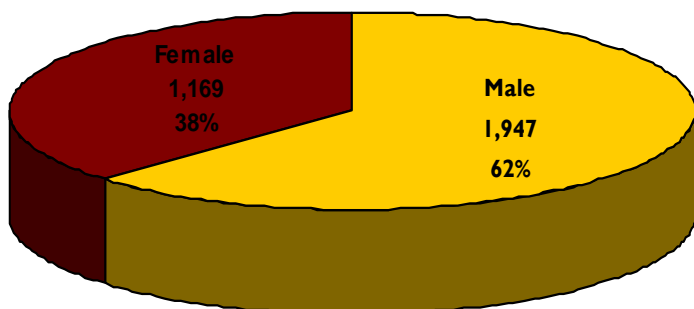

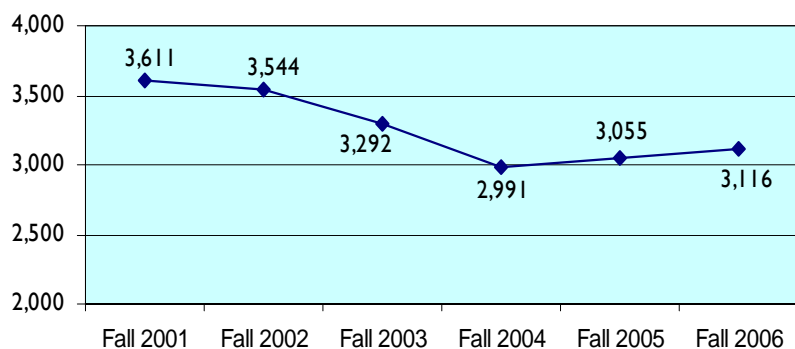

About the International Enrollment Report

The International Student Office (ISO) at Arizona State University (ASU) at the Tempe campus is under the administrative department of Educational Development. ISO supports student success by engaging non-immigrant students on the Tempe, Downtown Phoenix and Polytechnic campuses to responsibly maintain compliance to their visa status and by providing programming and advisement that enrich their educational experience.

The ISO publishes this report to inform collaborative partners about current enrollment, trends and changes that occurred in total international student enrollment on the four campuses of ASU. For purposes of this report, the terms *non-immigrant* and *international* are used interchangeably.

International Enrollment Trends

The non-immigrant student population exhibited an increase for the second consecutive year reaching 3,116 in fall 2006, an increase of 2 percent from 2005. Total enrollment at ASU increased by 4 percent during the same period.

One thousand twenty-seven new international students enrolled at ASU, an 11 percent increase of new students over the previous fall. Students beginning new programs in fall 2006 represented 33 percent of the total international student population. New undergraduate enrollment increased by 5 percent while new graduate enrollment increased by 14 percent. Of the 363 new undergraduates enrolling at ASU, the majority were freshmen.

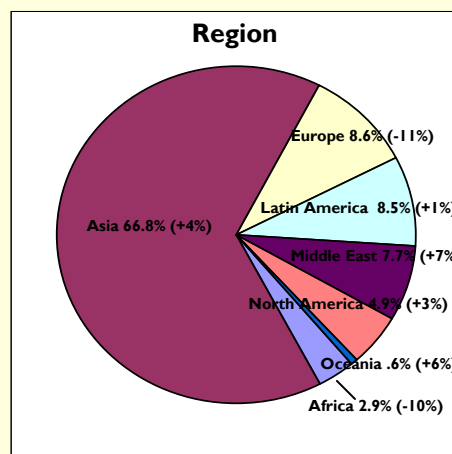
The vast majority of non-immigrants (90%) hold an F-1 or J-1 student visa and enrollment of male students exceeded that of females by 24 percent.

Countries of Origin

Non-immigrant students from Asia recorded the largest number of students (67%), with enrollment from the top two countries India and China increasing by 12 and 8 percent respectively. Saudi Arabia replaced Cyprus on the list of top fifteen countries in 2006 with an increase of 104 percent over last year. Total enrollment increased in every region with the exception of students from Africa and Europe.

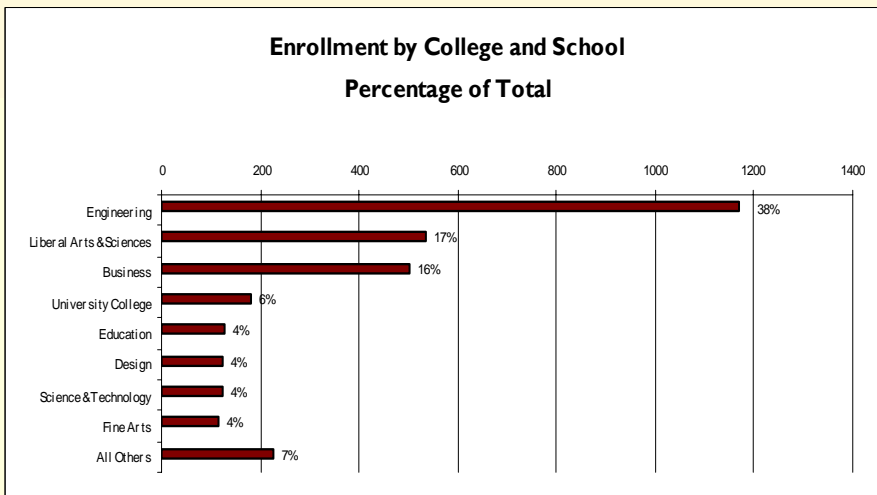
Colleges and Schools

The Ira A. Fulton School of Engineering was selected by the largest number of non-immigrant students (1,171) followed by the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences (537) and the W.P. Carey School of Business (504). The top three enrolling colleges and schools represented 71 percent of the total international student enrollment at ASU and 85 percent are completing academic programs at the Tempe campus.

Class Status

The majority of ASU non-immigrant students (63%) pursued graduate degrees with students distributed evenly between Masters and Doctoral programs.

Undergraduate students comprised 37 percent of the total international student population with students distributed evenly between the four major class levels. Freshman international students represented 26 percent of the undergraduate class for fall 2006.
